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

- Subject matter of the textbook is limited to the core of what students need to know i.e., it does not strive to be up-to-date with what many instructors can find in textbooks currently available on the market.
- Some content such as the chapter on poverty and examples on health care, is biased toward a freemarket approach - even more so than the standard principles of economics textbook, which is already heavily slanted toward conservative economic views of the labor market, microeconomic policy, and so on

- In-chapter examples and parables are somewhat off-putting and unengaging ("Does Baldness Cause Heart Disease?" not a very relevant or inspiring example of the uses of economics.)

What areas of this textbook require improvement in order for it to be used in your courses?

• Students won't get much more from the course, other than a grounding in the essential principles. I think that instructors in particular would find that they need to draw on other resources in order to supplement this textbook: I mean this both in terms of content (which is not up to market standards) and instructional design (i.e., the need to develop other examples or topics to make the course engaging).
